

# Alternatives to Abortion Report for Fiscal Year 2021

### As Required by

2022-23 General Appropriations Act, Senate Bill 1, 87th Legislature, Regular Session, 2021 (Article II, Health and Human Services Commission, Rider 68)

Texas Health and Human Services December 2021

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#### **Executive Summary**

The 2022-23 General Appropriations Act, Senate Bill 1, 87th Legislature, Regular Session, 2021 (Article II, Health and Human Services Commission [HHSC], Rider 68), requires HHSC to submit an annual report on the Alternatives to Abortion (A2A) program.

A2A services – including education, care coordination, material services, and housing and support through maternity homes – are delivered through contracted service providers and their subcontractors. Services are available to pregnant women, their families, and adoptive parents.

During fiscal year 2021, the A2A program contracted with four entities: Austin LifeCare, Human Coalition (HC), Longview Wellness Center, and Texas Pregnancy Care Network (TPCN). TPCN subcontracted with entities across the state, and Austin LifeCare had one subcontractor that provided A2A services. HC provided services at two locations, and Longview Wellness Center provided services at five locations. Altogether, the four contractors provided services at a total of 177 physical locations across Texas, including a hotline, one virtual clinic, and eight mobile units.

A2A served a total of 126,533 unduplicated clients who received 2,698,003 services in fiscal year 2021, which represents a 25 percent increase in clients served from fiscal year 2020<sup>1</sup>.

### Introduction

The 2022-23 General Appropriations Act, Senate Bill 1, 87th Legislature, Regular Session, 2021 (Article II, Health and Human Services Commission [HHSC], Rider 68), requires the agency to submit a report on the A2A program no later than December 1 of each fiscal year to the Governor and the Legislative Budget Board. As required by Rider 68, this report provides:

- 1. The total number of A2A providers, including subcontractors, by geographical region, and the total number of unduplicated clients served by each provider, by gender and age;
- 2. A description of A2A outreach efforts by providers and HHSC;
- 3. Total expenditures, by method of financing;
- 4. Total contract amounts by provider, including subcontractors; and
- 5. Any outcome measures included in contracts with providers.

Additionally, this report includes an overview of how the COVID-19 pandemic has impacted the A2A program and services.

### Background

The A2A program was created by the 2006-07 General Appropriations Act, Senate Bill 1, 79th Legislature, Regular Session, 2005 (Article II, Special Provisions Relating to all Health and Human Services Agencies, Section 50). A2A is a statewide program promoting childbirth and providing support services to pregnant women, their families, and adoptive parents. Services are available for Texas residents who are pregnant and up to three years post-partum. Clients who have suffered a miscarriage or loss of a child are eligible for services 90 calendar days after the miscarriage or loss. Adoptive parents are eligible for up to two years post-adoption finalization, regardless of the age of the child. Additionally, beginning in fiscal year 2021, the parent, legal guardian, or Adult Caregiver<sup>2</sup> of a minor (under the age of 18) who is a program client is also eligible for services.

A2A is designed to:

- Reduce abortions and improve pregnancy outcomes by helping women practice sound health-related behaviors and improve prenatal nutrition;
- Improve child health and development by helping parents provide responsible and competent care for their children; and
- Improve families' economic self-sufficiency by helping parents continue their education and secure employment.

The A2A program accomplishes its mission by providing the following support services:

- Counseling, mentoring, educational information, and classes on: pregnancy, parenting, adoption, life skills, and employment readiness;
- Material assistance such as car seats, clothing, diapers, and formula;
- Care coordination through referrals to government assistance programs and other social service programs;
- Call center for information or to schedule appointments; and
- Housing and support services through maternity homes.

A2A services are delivered through contracted service providers including pregnancy centers, social service providers, adoption agencies, and maternity homes for pregnant women. Program services are available in person, by phone, or online. In addition to contracting with service providers, HHSC monitors contracted providers' adherence to state and federal rules and policies, provides technical assistance, and collects and maintains program data. Refer to Appendix B for a breakdown of services provided and Appendix C for the 11 statewide HHSC service regions.

The 86th Legislature appropriated \$59,876,059.00 for A2A and authorized HHSC to transfer up to an additional \$20,000,000.00<sup>3</sup> for the 2020-21 biennium if HHSC determined there to be a demand based on program utilization. HHSC transferred and awarded a total of \$33,524,094.00 to two contractors (TPCN and HC) for the provision of A2A services in fiscal year 2020 and \$46,156,327.12 to four contractors (TPCN, HC, Austin LifeCare, and Longview Wellness Center) in fiscal year 2021.

During fiscal year 2021 mid-year reviews, HHSC determined contract funding adjustments were necessary. The two new contractors to the program, Austin LifeCare, and Longview Wellness Center, required additional time and resources to hire new staff, which impacted their ability to deliver services. Based on first and second quarter trends, both contractors projected the number of clients and expenditures for the remainder of the fiscal year. As a result, HHSC redistributed \$1,976,375.00 from Austin LifeCare and Longview Wellness Center to HC and TPCN based upon the original proportion of the total program budget for each contractor. In addition, \$330,046.67 of previously unawarded funds were also distributed to HC and TPCN.

The total contract values for fiscal year 2021 are reflected in Table 1.

HHSC reserved \$351,422.07 for the 2020-21 biennium to support and administer the A2A program.

#### **Number of Providers and Clients**

During fiscal year 2021, HHSC provided A2A services through four contracted service providers, TPCN, HC, Austin LifeCare, and Longview Wellness Center, across all 11 HHSC service regions in Texas (see Appendix C).

TPCN utilized a statewide network of 79 subcontractors with a total of 167 physical locations and seven mobile units throughout Texas; Austin LifeCare had one subcontractor service provider with a total of three physical locations and one mobile unit. HC delivered services directly through two clinics in Grapevine and Fort Worth and one virtual clinic utilizing tele-counseling and online delivery of educational material and classes. HC also provided non-medical goods and services to clients through on-site clinics and by drop shipping to its virtual clinic clients. Longview Wellness Center delivered services from five locations. All four A2A service providers offered counseling, mentoring, educational information, classes, material assistance, care coordination, and support services. For a list of providers and subcontractors by geographical region, see Appendix D.

As shown in greater detail in Table 2, the A2A program provided services to 126,533 unduplicated clients in fiscal year 2021. This represents a 25 percent increase from fiscal year 2020, when the A2A Program served 101,099 unduplicated clients. Of the total clients served, approximately 87 percent were female, and the greatest percentage of clients were between the ages of 23 and 29.

## **Outreach Efforts**

Outreach remained a priority for service providers and subcontractors in fiscal year 2021. Contracted A2A service providers increased outreach efforts in fiscal year 2021 to bolster awareness of the program by reaching eligible clients in need of services. These efforts included:

- Educational fairs;
- Webinars;
- Online advertising campaigns and A2A-specific websites; and
- Distribution of printed materials such as pamphlets, brochures, and postcards.

Austin LifeCare used digital advertising and an A2A-dedicated website to improve program awareness and reach those needing services across the state. In fiscal year 2021, Austin LifeCare hosted community outreach events at various locations including grocery stores, theaters, and shopping malls.

HC utilized search engine marketing advertisements and direct outreach targeting social service agencies such as food banks, diaper banks, adoption agencies, and maternity homes. HC's Community Outreach Coordinators developed relationships with local and state service providers and social service agencies. They also hosted quarterly webinars to provide education on A2A services and offer opportunities for collaboration.

Longview Wellness Center created community outreach events in coordination with local agencies, churches, school districts, and charities to promote A2A services. They provided individual face-to-face presentations, distributing program brochures and pamphlets to potential clients.

TPCN used its network of subcontractors to maintain and promote awareness in communities served. In addition to outreach efforts by the local subcontractors, TPCN conducted an outreach campaign from January 1, 2021 to August 31, 2021, through statewide digital media advertising targeting all 254 Texas counties and a radio and billboard campaign in August 2021.

HHSC continued to provide outreach efforts to its A2A contractors through collaboration with other state programs that serve women and families, such as

Women, Infants and Children (WIC), Medicaid, and the Nurse-Family Partnership (NFP). Connecting women and families with program information and access to services remains a priority for HHSC and a requirement of contracted A2A service providers.

# **Funding and Expenditures**

In fiscal years 2020-21, A2A received federal Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) block grant and state General Revenue funds to support services for pregnant women, their families, and adoptive parents. While A2A funding remained level for 2006-2009, it has increased since 2010 (refer to Table 3).

HHSC awarded a total of \$33,524,094.00, including contract amendments, for the provision of A2A services in fiscal year 2020 and \$46,156,327.12 in fiscal year 2021. Additionally, HHSC reserved \$351,422.07 for the 2020-21 biennium to support and administer the A2A program.

TANF block grant funding was distributed equally between the fiscal years of the biennium. HHSC expended \$3 million in TANF funds in fiscal year 2020, and \$3 million in fiscal year 2021.

#### **Outcome Measures for A2A Providers**

In fiscal year 2021, the A2A program provided 2,698,003 services to clients across Texas. A2A providers and subcontractors provided services to 126,533 unduplicated clients in fiscal year 2021, exceeding the performance target of 102,183 included in the 2020-21 General Appropriations Act, House Bill 1, 86th Legislature, Regular Session, 2019. This represents a 25 percent increase in the number of clients served compared to fiscal year 2020.

In fiscal year 2021, the A2A program had two outcome measures for service providers:

- 1. At least 20 percent of A2A clients referred to NFP successfully enroll in the program.
- 2. At least 20 percent of A2A clients referred to Medicaid successfully enroll in the program.

NFP is a free program where specially trained nurses regularly visit first-time mothers-to-be starting early in the pregnancy and continuing through the child's second birthday. The expectant mothers benefit by getting the care and support they need to have a healthy pregnancy. The A2A program referred 21,305 clients (17 percent of total clients) to NFP. Due to nurse availability in the NFP program, enrollment may be lower in certain areas, even if referrals increase. NFP utilizes a waitlist if there is a shortage of nurse availability. Medicaid provides medical coverage in the state through managed care health plans under contract with the state. It ensures pregnant women and their children receive timely and adequate care during and after their pregnancies. Successfully enrolled clients are shown below in the enrollment percentages in Table 5.

# **COVID-19 Pandemic Impact**

The COVID-19 pandemic required the A2A program to adapt service provision as needed to continue to meet the needs of clients safely.

A2A providers experienced several adverse outcomes attributable to COVID-19 including:

- Difficulty retaining staff due to parents needing to stay home with children;
- Challenges recruiting new staff to fill vacancies within the A2A program to implement services; and
- Increased client needs for housing, transportation, and job assistance that contractors could not always meet.

A2A providers were able to experience positive outcomes including:

- Increased services to clients in more rural counties through virtual services;
- Expansion of virtual service options, including classes and counseling; and
- Delivery of material goods to their respective communities through drive-by and curbside material assistance.

Although COVID-19 changed aspects of service delivery, A2A providers adjusted and continued to meet the needs of their clients.

## Conclusion

In fiscal year 2021, the A2A program continued to increase the number of clients receiving A2A services across Texas despite the challenges presented by COVID-19. The A2A program service providers delivered services to 126,533 unduplicated clients, representing a 25 percent increase from fiscal year 2020. HHSC will utilize A2A funding to continue to serve additional clients and further the goals of A2A by reducing abortions, improving pregnancy outcomes, improving child health and development, and improving families' economic self-sufficiency.


