## What is the TSHL?

- A volunteer, non-partisan, statewide organization of advocates operating without public funds
- Authorized in 1985 by the 69th Texas Legislature under Governor Mark White



- Elected and appointed for two-year term
- 123 volunteers aged 60 and over representing older Texans from across the 28 Texas Area Agencies on Aging (AAAs)

### Legislative Session: May 1-5 We're Back Austin!



It's hard to believe that the last time the Texas Silver-Haired Legislature met on the floor of the House of Representatives was July 15, 2019 (pictured above). Two years and ten months later, as we are hopefully emerging from the pandemic, we are scheduled to hold our 19th Legislative Session back where we belong!

For many of our members, the upcoming session will be the first time they have experienced the majesty, the pride, and the sense of responsibility that comes with being on the House floor and conducting business as a body modeled after the Texas Legislature.

Following many hours of research, phone calls, emails, and virtual conferences, our members have proposed 68 resolutions to be debated and voted on. The results of our deliberations next month will be included in our Legislative Report which will be distributed to all Texas Legislators and AAAs in the late summer/early Fall of 2022.

At that point the even harder work begins as we work with individual Legislators and their staff to get as many resolutions as possible turned into legislation and eventually enacted.


We do this work in collaboration with our Area Agencies on Aging, other organizations and agencies that advocate for issues affecting older Texans, and Legislators and legislative staffers.

# 2021 Texas Legislative Session—State Laws Enacted That Were Influenced by TSHL Advocacy

- Expand Telemedicine Law to Include Teledentistry
- Prevent Financial Abuse of Older Texans; Enhance TX Penal Code for Offenders
- Strengthen Rural Broadband Infrastructure
- Simplify Certification/Recertification Process for SNAP for Older Texans
- Allow Licensed Physicians to Legally Prescribe Medical Cannabis and Support Evidence-Based Testing of Cannabis

# 2021 Texas Legislative Session—State Laws Enacted That Were Influenced by TSHL Advocacy, cont'd.



- Multiple laws supporting funding for ERS, TRS Pension, and TRS Care
- Maintain Funding for Texas Lifespan Respite Care Program
- Require Criminal Background Checks for CNAs and LVNs in Assisted Living and Nursing Homes
- Increase Access to Telemedicine for Older Adults
- Improve Access to Healthcare in Rural Texas for Older Texans


## Area Agencies on Aging

### **TOP 10 PRIORITY RESOLUTIONS**

The 19<sup>th</sup> TSHL passed a total of fifty-four resolutions during the Legislative Session, May 2-5, 2022. The resolutions that follow ask the 88<sup>th</sup> Texas Legislature for specific actions to benefit older Texans. The 19<sup>th</sup> TSHL membership selected these "Top Ten" priorities as those most important to older Texans statewide:

- #1 –R003 Increase the Personal Needs Allowance for Medicaid Residents in Nursing Homes
- #2 -R041 Child-Related Income Follows the Child
- #3 -R046 Readability of the Application and Vote-by-Mail Documentation to Reduce the Rejection Rate
- #4 –R024 Authorize TRS to Provide a Cost-of-Living Adjustment to Teacher Retirement System Retirees
- #5 –R001 Require a Criminal Background Check for CNAs and LVNs in Nursing Homes and Home Health Companies
- #6 –R022 Authorize a 13<sup>th</sup> Month Annuity Payment to Employees Retirement System (ERS) Retirees
- #7 -R042 Amend Family Code to Provide for a Grandparent Conservatorship and Support Bill
- #8 -R037 Improve Access to Healthcare in Rural Texas for Older Texans
- #9 -R008 Establish Full Practice Authority (FPA) for Advanced Practice Registered Nurses (APRNs)
- #10 –R009 Increase the Maximum Rate of Home-Delivered Meals for Older Texans to \$10.00 with an Annual Cost-of-Living Adjustment

### **HISTORY**

The Texas Silver-Haired Legislature was created by the 69<sup>th</sup> Texas Legislature with the adoption of SCR 37, April 3, 1985. The first Session was held in 1986 and has continued for 35+ years. Seniors 60 and over are elected to a 2-year term by their peers from 28 regions in Texas. Since 1985, more than 700 seniors have been elected legislators. TSHL is a total volunteer group with no paid staff or office; TSHL is not supported by State Funds.

The TSHL Foundation - The founders established the TSHL Foundation in 1985 as a non-profit (501(c)(3) agency to raise funds to support TSHL. Other resources come from individual members who finance their travel and other expenses. The Foundation actively solicits tax-deductible gifts, grants, and donations that will support the operational expenses of the TSHL Legislature for its training and orientation meetings and its research and policy-development activities.

### TSHL RESULTS

Since inception, over 250 bills have passed the Texas Legislature that were directly influenced by the work of the TSHL. Fifteen TSHL resolutions were accomplished, partially or fully, by laws enacted in the 2021 Texas Legislative Session. A few highlights from past years:

- ✓ Increase and maintain the financial strength of Teacher Retirement System (TRS) and Employee Retirement System (ERS) benefits
- ✓ Increase personal needs allowance for nursing home residents to \$60
- ✓ Create criminal offense for engaging in financial abuse of older Texans
- ✓ Simplification of re/certification of eligibility for SNAP
- Expansion of rural broadband services
- Expansion of medical conditions for prescribing use of low-THC cannabis products and support of medical cannabis research
- Criminal background check of employees and applicants at special care facilities.
