Client Feedback

Total # of clients who responded to survey: 82

Clients surveyed identified themselves as:

- Pregnant: 73%
- Breastfeeding: 43%
- Caretaker of baby under 12 months: 33%
- Caretaker of a child over 1 year: 48%
- Friend of family: 18%
- First WIC class: 35%

Language in which the class was taught:

- English 65%
- Spanish 24%
- Both 11%

Compared to other WIC classes, clients awarded this class 4.9 stars (out of 5).

Clients indicated one thing they learned that they would try at home. Out of 69 write-in responses, themes for the comments included:

- Breastfeeding is important, and there are many benefits of breastfeeding (every ounce counts breastfeed as long as you can)
- Ideas for trying new breastfeeding positions/holds and latching/unlatching techniques
- Hold baby skin-to-skin or breastfeed the baby in just a diaper
- Feel encouraged to breastfeed and understand how
- How to hand express breastmilk; plugged duct massage

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Staff Feedback

Total # of staff who responded to the survey: 9

Staff surveyed included: CA (2), BF Coordinator (1), LA Director (1), BF Peer Counselor (5) and had the following degrees: LVN (2), Other (7).

Language in which the class was taught:

- English 67%
- Spanish 0%
- Both 33%

Staff reported the following as working well when teaching the class:

- Clients appreciate a class with lots of helpful breastfeeding information that they otherwise may not know about. At times you can touch on the specific benefit of bm/bf that really interests them and that can start a class discussion and cause others to ask questions that they may have been too shy to ask.
- The more clients, the better. The more mom or their sweetie is interested, the better the class. Even if they don't like to talk, they will ask questions.
- Open discussion
- What worked well is having the lesson plan in-hand and it is easy to follow. For me it is an outline to what we can relate to the class
- Having a hands-on activity. The clients seem to like this better and interact with you more.

What staff would do differently the next time they teach the class:

- Nothing
- Some of the "cute" options provided are too time consuming for a busy clinic schedule
- Try to get every mother to ask a question
- Spend more time getting ready
- Keep moms' interest by asking questions
- Try to pick questions pertaining to the clients (pregnant or breastfeeding)
