

Alternatives to Abortion Report for Fiscal Year 2020

**As Required by
2020-21 General Appropriations Act,

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Executive Summary

The 2020-21 General Appropriations Act, House Bill (H.B.) 1, 86th Legislature, Regular Session, 2019 (Article II, Health and Human Services Commission [HHSC], Rider 80), requires HHSC to submit an annual report on the Alternatives to Abortion (A2A) program.

A2A services, including education, care coordination, material services, and housing and support through maternity homes, are delivered through contracted service providers, including subcontractors, and are available to pregnant women, their families, and adoptive parents. The A2A program continues to see increases in the number of clients served each year.

During fiscal year 2020, the A2A program contracted with two entities – Texas Pregnancy Care Network (TPCN) and Human Coalition (HC). TPCN in turn, subcontracted with entities across the state for the provision of A2A services. By the close of fiscal year 2020, TPCN services were provided through 80 subcontractors. HC provided services at two brick and mortar locations. TPCN and HC together provided services at a total of 171 locations across Texas, including the hotline. A total of 1,079,731 services were provided to A2A clients. Additionally, a total of 101,099 unduplicated clients were served in fiscal year 2020, which represents a 52 percent increase from fiscal year 2019. Due to the additional funds appropriated by the 86th Legislature, HHSC also re-procured contracts for the A2A program. Through the re-procurement, two additional contracts were awarded beginning in fiscal year 2021, resulting in a total of four contracted A2A service providers.

1. Introduction

The 2020-21 General Appropriations Act, H.B. 1, 86th Legislature, Regular Session, 2019 (Article II, Health and Human Services Commission [HHSC], Rider 80(c)), requires the agency to submit a report on the A2A program no later than December 1 of each fiscal year to the Governor and the Legislative Budget Board (LBB). As required by Rider 80, this report provides:

1. The total number of A2A providers, including subcontractors, by geographical region, and the total number of unduplicated clients served by each provider, by gender and age;
2. A description of A2A outreach efforts by providers and HHSC;
3. Total expenditures, by method of financing;
4. Total contract amounts by provider, including subcontractors; and
5. Any outcome measures included in contracts with providers.

Additionally, this report provides an overview of the impact that the coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic has had on the A2A program and services.

2. Background

The A2A program was created by the 2006-07 General Appropriations Act, Senate Bill 1, 79th Legislature, Regular Session, 2005 (Article II, Special Provisions Relating to all Health and Human Services Agencies, Section 50). A2A is a statewide program promoting childbirth and providing support services to pregnant women, their families, and adoptive parents. Services are also available for 90 calendar days after miscarriage or loss of a child, and to adoptive parents for up to two years post-adoption finalization, regardless of the age of the child.

A2A is designed to:

- Reduce abortions and improve pregnancy outcomes by helping women practice sound health-related behaviors and improve prenatal nutrition;
- Improve child health and development by helping parents provide responsible and competent care for their children; and
- Improve families' economic self-sufficiency by helping parents continue their education and find a job.

The A2A program accomplishes its mission by providing the following support services:

- Counseling, mentoring, educational information, and classes on: pregnancy, parenting, adoption, life skills, and employment readiness;
- Material assistance such as car seats, clothing, diapers, and formula;
- Care coordination through referrals to government assistance programs and other social service programs;
- Call center for information or to schedule appointments; and
- Housing and support services through maternity homes.

Refer to Appendix A for a breakdown of services provided and Appendix B for the 11 statewide HHSC service regions.

A2A services are delivered through contracted service providers, including pregnancy centers, social service providers, adoption agencies, and maternity homes for pregnant women. A2A services are available in person, by phone, or online to eligible pregnant women or parents up to three years postpartum. In addition to contracting with service providers, HHSC monitors contracted providers' adherence to state and federal rules and policies, provides technical assistance, and collects and maintains program data.

In fiscal year 2019, HHSC contracted with two providers to provide A2A services, TPCN and HC. That same year, the 86th Legislature appropriated \$59,876,059 for A2A and authorized HHSC to transfer up to a total of \$20,000,000 for the 2020-21 biennium if HHSC determined there to be a demand based on program utilization.

In 2019, HHSC issued a request for stakeholder input to determine how the agency could best utilize increased funding to meet the growing demand for A2A services. HHSC released a Request for Application (RFA), which included program enhancements based on stakeholder input. The enhancements clarify that client referrals to HHSC’s Healthy Texas Women program or Family Planning Program for contraception services are allowable, increase transparency and oversight of the program, and expand the definition of a program client to include the parent, legal guardian, or adult caregiver of a minor who is a program client.

To ensure existing providers had access to the additional funds and program growth was not hindered throughout the RFA process, HHSC amended contracts for both TPCN and HC to increase funds based on a demonstrated need. HHSC awarded an additional \$1,106,785 to HC and \$9,276,009 to TPCN through contract amendments. The additional funding allowed the providers and subcontractors to sustain the A2A program’s growth. The total amended contract values for fiscal year 2020 are reflected in Table 6.

Through the 2020 RFA, HHSC awarded contracts to four respondents for fiscal year 2021, including TPCN, HC, Austin LifeCare, and Longview Wellness as shown in Table 1.

All funds appropriated to the A2A program and authorized for transfer will be expended during the 2020-21 biennium.

3. Number of Providers and Clients

During fiscal year 2020, HHSC provided A2A services through two contracted service providers, TPCN and HC, across all 11 HHSC public health regions in Texas (see Appendix B).

TPCN utilized a statewide network of 80 subcontractors with a total of 169 locations throughout Texas. TPCN provided counseling, mentoring, educational information, classes, material assistance, care coordination, and support services. HC delivered services directly through two clinics in Grapevine and Fort Worth, mobile clinics, and a virtual clinic utilizing tele-counseling and online delivery of educational material and classes. HC also provided non-medical goods and services to clients through onsite clinics and by delivery for virtual clients. For a list of providers and subcontractors by geographical region, see Appendix C.

As shown in greater detail Table 2, the A2A program provided services to 101,099 unduplicated clients in fiscal year 2020. This represents a 52 percent increase from fiscal year 2019. Of the total clients served, approximately 90 percent were female, and the greatest percentage of clients were between the ages of 23 and 29.

4. Outreach Efforts

Outreach remained a priority for service providers and subcontractors in fiscal year 2020. Contracted A2A service providers increased outreach efforts in fiscal year 2020 to ensure awareness of the program by reaching eligible clients in need of services. These efforts included:

- Community outreach, such as educational fairs and community events;
- Online advertising campaigns; and
- Distribution of printed materials such as pamphlets, brochures, and postcards.

TPCN uses its network of subcontractors to maintain and promote awareness in communities served. In addition to outreach efforts by the local subcontractors, TPCN conducted an outreach campaign from September 1, 2019, to August 31, 2020, through statewide digital media advertising targeting all 254 Texas counties.

HC conducted a direct mail delivery outreach campaign targeting social service agencies including, but not limited to, food banks, diaper banks, housing authorities, and in rural areas, agricultural extension agents. HC sent out 20,700 HHSC-approved brochures in both English and Spanish, explaining A2A program and services and how to assist at-risk clients.

The A2A program continues to collaborate with other state programs and organizations such as the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC), Medicaid, and the Nurse-Family Partnership (NFP). The A2A program initiated educational webinars focusing on eligibility and enrollment of various HHSC programs and services. The programs are continuing to work together to ensure clients are aware of services available and to identify areas of further collaboration. Connecting women and families to resources and services remains a priority for HHSC and a requirement of contracted A2A service providers.

5. Funding and Expenditures

A2A receives federal Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) block grant and state General Revenue (GR) funds to support services for pregnant women, their families, and adoptive parents. While A2A funding remained level for 2006-2009, it has increased since 2010 (refer to Table 5).

HHSC awarded a total of \$33,524,094 (including contract amendments) for the provision of A2A services in fiscal year 2020 and \$45,826,280.45 in fiscal year 2021. Additionally, HHSC reserved \$525,684.55 for the 2020-21 biennium to support and administer the A2A program.

TANF block grant funding is distributed equally between the fiscal years of the biennium. HHSC expended \$3 million in TANF funds in fiscal year 2020, leaving \$3 million to distribute in the fiscal year 2021 contracts.

6. Outcome Measures for A2A Providers

In fiscal year 2020, the A2A program provided 1,079,731 services to clients across Texas. Additionally, in fiscal year 2020, A2A providers and subcontractors provided services to 101,099 unduplicated clients, exceeding the performance target of 96,646 included in the 2020-21 General Appropriations Act, H.B. 1, 86th Legislature, Regular Session, 2019. This represents a 52 percent increase in the number of clients served compared to fiscal year 2019.

Beginning in fiscal year 2020, the A2A program added two outcome measures, which require each provider to meet the following:

1. At least 20 percent of A2A clients referred to Nurse-Family Partnership successfully enroll in the program.
2. At least 20 percent of A2A clients referred to Medicaid successfully enroll in the program.

NFP is a free program where specially trained nurses regularly visit young, first-time moms-to-be starting early in the pregnancy and continuing through the child's second birthday. The expectant moms benefit by getting the care and support they need to have a healthy pregnancy. The A2A program referred 21,522 clients (21 percent of total clients) to NFP, however not all eligible clients have been enrolled due to funding and capacity limitations within the NFP program. A2A clients referred to but not currently enrolled in NFP have been placed on waitlists.

Table 7 is a summary of the fiscal year 2020 A2A outcome measure data for both providers.

HHSC will continue to work with agency contracting and data staff to measure the impact of A2A services and the outcome goals of the program and to determine if additional performance measures should be included in future contracts or amendments.

7. COVID-19 Pandemic Impact

Like many health and human services programs across the state, A2A providers were impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. The A2A program experienced a 102 percent increase in services provided from March 2020 to August 2020 in comparison to the number of services provided during the pre COVID-19 period of September 2019 to February 2020.

To address client needs and the increased demand for material goods, A2A providers and subcontractors worked closely with NFP to assist pregnant women and facilitate shipping of requested material goods to clients in need across the state. The delivery of these materials was critical due to A2A service areas experiencing a shortage of diapers and baby necessities.

Contracted providers also implemented new service delivery and subcontractor support models to allow clients to receive services over the phone and material assistance in curbside settings. For example, HC extended their call-in hours, while TPCN performed the annual monitoring of subcontractors via videoconferencing.

Additionally, one provider adopted an operational change in the way programs document client interaction and acknowledgement of telephone services. This change increased provider oversight of telephone services and assisted programs in ensuring service quality was maintained.

By changing service delivery and subcontractor support models, providers were able to ensure continuity of services and meet the needs of clients efficiently and effectively.

Conclusion

In fiscal year 2020, the A2A program continued to increase the number of clients receiving A2A services across Texas. The A2A program provided services to 101,099 unduplicated clients, representing a 52 percent increase from fiscal year 2019. HHSC will utilize funding to continue to serve additional clients and further the goals of A2A by reducing abortions, improving pregnancy outcomes, improving child health and development, and improving families' economic self-sufficiency.

HHSC has focused efforts on streamlining and enhancing efficiencies across state agencies and local organizations that provide support services to women and children, which includes providing referrals to relevant social service programs to ensure positive outcomes and promote self-sufficiency. In fiscal year 2020, A2A providers significantly increased the number of eligible clients referred to NFP and Medicaid resulting in more A2A clients being enrolled in the programs. The A2A program initiated educational webinars focusing on eligibility and enrollment of various HHSC programs and services. The goal is to ensure all clients are knowledgeable of available benefits and services and the enrollment processes.

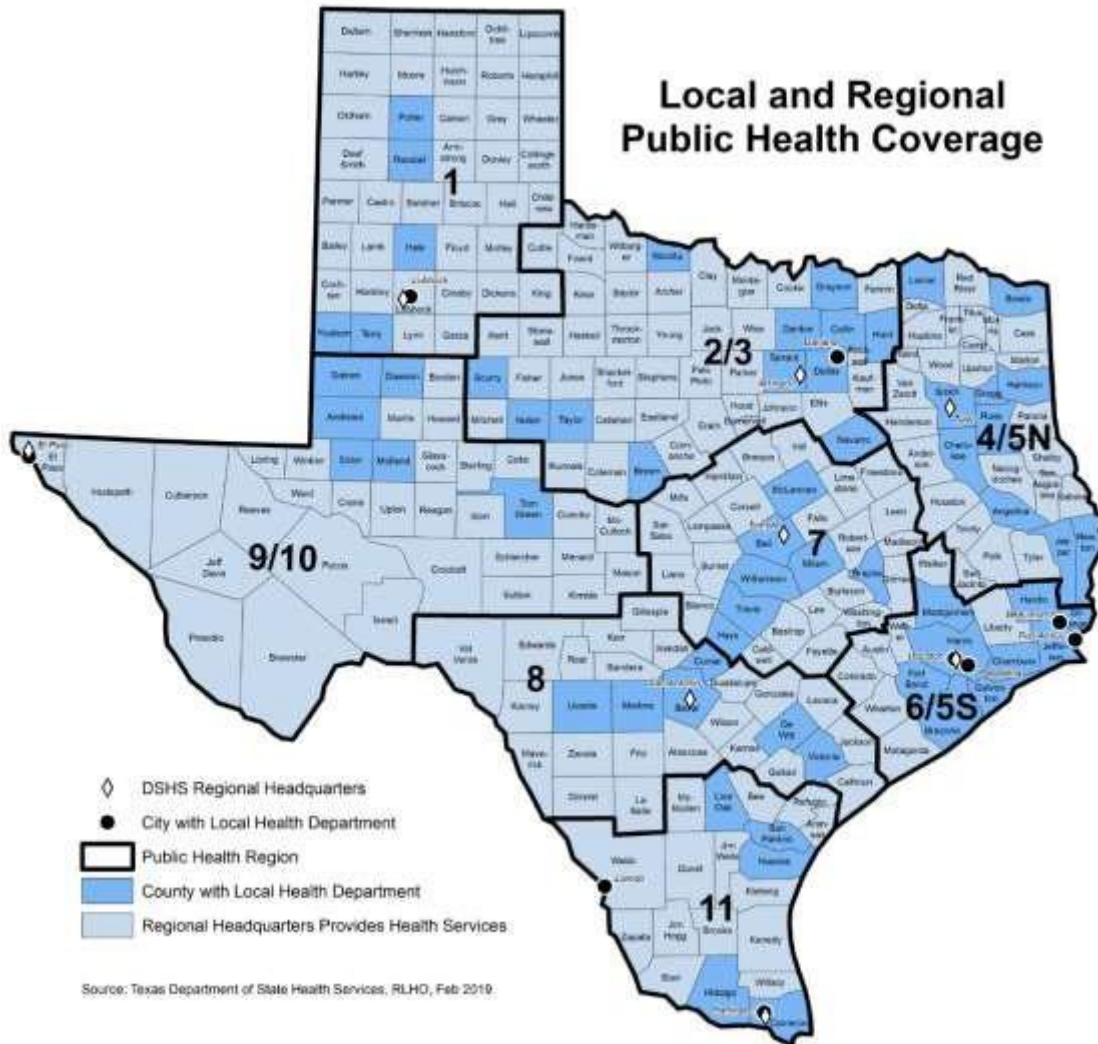
