System Challenges



- Approximately 40 percent of people booked in Texas county jails have accessed services through a local mental health authority (LMHA) or local behavioral health authority (LBHA) in the past three years.
- Referrals for inpatient competency restoration services at a state hospital increased 38 percent over past 20 years.
- Geography presents service delivery challenges: 268,597 square miles, 70 percent rural, 254 counties and county governments.
- Forensic waiting list exceeds capacity of state hospitals.



Sequential Intercept Model Mapping Initiative






Sequential Intercept Model (SIM)



Top Priorities Across Communities

- Expand crisis options through the development of diversion centers
- Establish or strengthen local behavioral health leadership teams
- Increase data collection and information sharing across the SIM
- Enhance training on MI, SUD, and IDD for justice system stakeholders
- Expand housing options for people who are justice involved
- Enhance jail-based services, re-entry planning, and continuity of care





2022 SIM Mappings - Early Outcomes







- County funding secured. Federal
 American Rescue Plan funds allocated
 to support SIM priorities:
 - ▶ Diversion centers
 - ▶ Mental Health Officers
- Opportunities identified to leverage existing resources to expand local crisis continuums:
 - ▶ Mobile Crisis Outreach Teams
 - ▶ Low barrier-drop off options
- New community partnerships developed and additional education and training provided to support SIM priorities



SIM 2023 Outlook

- Continue to support counties mapped in 2022
 - ▶ SIM Community of Practice launched on March 31, 2023
 - ▶ Provide on-demand technical assistance
- Evaluate impact of SIM Mapping
 - ► Continue 6-month and 12-month follow up assessments
 - ▶ Partner with University of Texas, Texas Institute for Excellence in Mental Health to conduct an evaluation of the SIM Initiative
- Support strategic planning in counties across
 Texas
 - ▶ Launch HHSC's Youth SIM Mapping Initiative
 - ▶ Continue to conduct Adult SIM Workshops







Launched: April 2023


